Report by the President ISS/SIC

The RCS Commission on the Future of Surgery report (futureofsurgery.rcseng.ac.uk) listed four areas of technological development that will make the greatest impact in transforming surgery over the next two decades:

- minimally-invasive surgery
- imaging, virtual reality and augmented reality
- big data, genomics, and artificial intelligence
- specialized interventions

However, the world will not be the same in 2045. We as surgeons are not working in a vacuum, and there are several global megatrends that will determine the future for us and for our planet well before the year 2045.

Should we be concerned about it or just go about our work, treating patients as we did in the past and do today, and not

worry too much about what is happening around us, in the society, globally? I strongly believe that we as individuals as well as a profession should not just be concerned but actively be involved in trying to shape the future to the best of our combined abilities.

A list of some of the current megatrends shaping our immediate future, in no particular order, contains the following:

- re-activation of the nuclear arms race and the fundamental changes in conventional warfare
- erosion of rule-based world order and increasing number of autocratic nations
- global economic inequality and the risk of mass migrations
- illusion of the feasibility of constant economic growth in a planet with limited resources
- concentration of economic power (and data) into the hands of a few transnational companies
- the threat of misusing and abusing artificial intelligence
- frustration in the battle against catastrophic climate change

There are nine countries that have nuclear weapons but excluding North Korea, nuclear testing has been limited with international agreements since the 1990s. However, the recent report of a new type of Russian missile and the statement of the US President Donald Trump about the option of starting nuclear tests have opened up the possibility of returning to a global nuclear arms race. Equally worrisome is the veiled threat to use tactical or battlefield nuclear weapons in Ukraine. But even conventional warfare has undergone fundamental changes with the use of drones. That has also affected the management of wounded soldiers and civilians. Frontline surgery has become obsolete, medical facilities and personnel have become targets, transferring patients at least during day time is dangerous, and finally, surgery needs to go deep underground, and be protected from drone attacks.

The war in Ukraine gets (and rightly so) plenty of media coverage, and the hope for a peace agreement seems distant in

the short term. But there are other wars that have been more or less forgotten. For example, in Sudan, two armed factions have been fighting since 2023, and have committed numerous war crimes, killing (according to some estimates, over 100,000 people have died during the conflict), raping, and starving their countrymen forcing more than a million refugees to look for relief. According to WHO, 460 people were killed in an obstetric hospital in one day. What is the main reason for the civil war? Fight for resources, especially gold.

In the conflict between Israel and Palestinians, the government of Israel has been accused of grave human rights violations, not just in Gaza, but also in the West Bank. The attack by Hamas was an absolute crime, but the massive and continuing response by the Israeli government cannot be justified in any way. And with that, the only viable solution, a two-stage model with 1967 borders is getting more and more unachievable.

The erosion of rule-based world order is not just visible in current wars. Systematic erosion of balanced division of power, independence of the judicial arm of governments, ignoring international agreements and challenging basic human rights is a trend clearly visible in many Western countries that used to be liberal democracies. The same trend has been or is increasingly becoming the norm also in other parts of the world.

Economic inequality both within and between nations is increasing. Inequality is growing for more than 70% of the global population, exacerbating the risks of divisions and hampering economic and social development according to a UN flagship study. It shows that the richest 1% of the population are the big winners in the changing global economy, increasing their share of income between 1990 and 2015, while at the other end of the scale, the bottom 40% earned less than a quarter of income in all countries surveyed. One of the consequences of inequality within societies, notes the report, is slower economic growth in unequal societies, with wide disparities in areas such as health care and education, where people are more likely to remain trapped in poverty, across several generations.

Moreover, the debts and the interest of the loans of the global south to European and US banks are much higher than the total development aid flowing from developed to developing countries. It is futile to think that the problem will be solved with more loans and “projects”. Erasing the loans completely would be the only durable solution that would give the developing countries a chance to improve the living conditions of their populations. The bleak vision of the future combined with droughts caused by global warming will according to recent estimates result in mass migration of people towards north, further aggravating the grim situation in many countries, especially in Africa.

The use (or abuse) of artificial intelligence and fight for digital supremacy will, and is already causing fundamental changes in all areas of life including medicine. Additional worries can be attributed to the ownership structure of big data; large transnational companies spearhead the development using social media and other sources of information to create new ways to increase their already huge profits with no proper regulation.

No discussion of the future would be complete without addressing the existential question of climate change. It is closely linked to the delusion of infinite economic growth. Even “sustainable” technology such as electric vehicles and wind turbines faces physical limits and brings along environmental costs as well as geopolitical tensions related to materials used in green energy production and use. Our planet has limited resources, and without rapid turn to sustainability, we are facing catastrophic consequences. According to some estimates, we have this decade to strongly limit the use of fossil fuels and use other measures to limit the rise of global temperature to two degrees. At the time of writing this, the climate congress in Brazil is taking place in a few days, but with the low-level participation of some of the highest polluting countries, and the strong lobbying power of oil companies and oil-producing nations, the chances of making significant progress are limited.

I understand that the above comments are far from the surgical world, but then

again, we do not work in a vacuum. The fundamental changes in the world will affect our profession, patients, families and the global medical community in very profound way. As a profession and as an International Society of Surgery our abilities to influence “the big picture” are limited. But big changes require big decisions, and in the end, all big decisions are made by people. Each of us can influence our immediate surroundings as well as more extended circles. But paraphrasing an old revolutionary, what then has to be done? Hopefully, we will have a chance to discuss also these issues in April in Mexico City. I sincerely welcome you all to attend

the International Surgical Week on 19 – 23 April 2026, where we can exchange views, not just about surgery, but about life in general.

In my President’s welcome letter in this Newsletter about a year ago I stated: “ISS/SIC must work together with other global organizations such as the World Health Organization, G4 Alliance, the International Committee of the Red Cross, Greenpeace, Amnesty International, Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change and many other organizations sharing our values and commitments to make our planet a safer, more just and healthy

place to live and raise future generations. As surgeons, we have the authority and goodwill among large sections of populations worldwide, and we should use that. A dream is the first step to developing a plan, and no dream is too big when facing existential challenges.” I am still dreaming.

Report Secretary-General

This has been another busy year both for your Society and for our Offices. International Surgical Week (ISW) was held in Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia in August 2024. This turned out to be one of the most successful congresses we have had in the last few years, under the presidency of our immediate past president Cheng Har Yip, associated with the College of Surgeons of the Academy of Medicine of Malaysia. The venue was excellent, the attendance was very encouraging, and there was tremendous interaction between all the attendees – young and old, developed and developing worlds.

We are currently putting the finishing touches to the 51st International Surgical week, in Mexico City from 19-23 April 2026, together with our partner, Asociación Mexicana de Cirugía Endoscópica - AMCE. We are looking forward enormously to the meeting, details of which are below. Note that early-bird registration finishes soon. We have had over 800 abstracts; the variety of submis-

sions and the high quality has been amazing. Through events beyond our control, we are aware of other international events in close proximity, though not overlapping too directly. Details of ISW are included in this newsletter, and it is a cost-effective destination. The Congress itself will take place at the Hotel Camino Royal Polanco in Mexico City, which is also the Congress Hotel.

2025 has been a diverse year for your Society with significant changes on a number of fronts:

World Journal of Surgery

As you are aware, we are now collaborating with our Publisher, Wiley to produce an even more successful Journal. Our Editor-in-Chief, Dr Sherry Wren and her Associate Editor Board continue to do a huge amount of work, and it is fitting that the Impact Factor has continued to rise, recognising their efforts, such that WJS is now in the top 25% tier of all Surgical Journals globally. Her report is elsewhere in this newsletter. She has already bought number of innovative ideas, and you will see changes in the journal continue to develop as we broaden its appeal. Effective end of this year, print versions of the Journal will no longer be produced, and we will be wholly digital. Given the nature of your Society, it is very important that changes broaden scientific and financial

access to the journal, since its very nature means that it is the World's Journal of Surgery. Access is, of course, at no charge to you as a member.

Logo

As you know, the Logo of the Society was changed to reflect the changing nature of the Society itself, and the global role which it now plays. This is only the second time it has been updated since our founding in 1902, the first revision was in 1957. We hope that our new logo reflects the Society as it now is, and its current makeup.

International Surgical Week 2026

We are looking forward to seeing you in Mexico City in four months from now. We were last in Mexico in August 1997, Acapulco, which was one of our most successful meetings. This was through the huge support of our Mexican surgical members, led by Jorge Cervantes, with several thousand delegates in attendance. See the extended report, below.

International Surgical Week 2028

We were last in Africa in August 2005. In principle, the Meeting rotates between the "Americas," EMEA (Europe, the Middle East and Africa), and the Asia Pacific Region, including Australasia, and all of Asia. The venue for the 2028 meeting will be Cape Town, to be held from 26-30 March, 2028.

We are expecting to visit the Asia Pacific Region for the 2030 meeting. If you know of and are prepared to put a suitable venue forward, then we would love to hear from you.

ISS Council

There are a number of new appointments to the Council of the ISS, who will be submitted for approval at the meeting in Mexico City. While the Nominations Committee has made several Nominations, we are additionally looking for a new Membership Councillor to represent our National Delegates, who themselves represent their country's individual members. We need to listen closely to what you, the member wish from your Society.

We have also created a new Councillor responsible for advising on Education. With the anticipated joining of IASSS to the Society, also covering Surgeons in Training, it will be critically important to listen to the needs of this group of our members. We have set an age limit of between 35 and 50 years for this Councillor, as it will be important for the individual to be "young enough to remember what it was like, and old enough in terms of experience, to make a difference." Details of how to apply are in this newsletter.

Integrated and other Societies.

For many years, the International Society of Surgery has general members, and Integrated Societies from core specialties are incorporated in the overall organization.

One of our founding integrated societies (IAES), the endocrine surgeons have long been associated with this organization. They have now elected to go their own way, although we will continue to have close ties with them and share journal. A considerable number of our members, who have an endocrine practice, have expressed their wish to continue as members, and contribute to our role in Endocrine Surgery globally. We are grateful for their continuing enthusiasm; our Scientific Programme reflects the interest that has been shown. This will continue to be a feature of International Surgical Week.

There is a global need for all aspects of the endocrine repertoire, involving both Spe-

cialist Endocrine Surgeons, and General Surgeons performing endocrine surgery. We hope that our close relationship with IAES will continue even as the interests diverge. To the IAES, we wish you well and every success in this change of role.

The other major change is that having welcomed the Alliance for Surgery and Anesthesia presence (ASAP) in 2013, the nature of surgery across the world has changed, perhaps making the need for specialist Integrated Society such as a ASAP less critical than it once was; many of the roles of ASAP have been taken over by a much wider group of surgeons within the ISS/SIC itself. In 2024, ASAP therefore decided that as an integrated society it would be disbanded from August 2024. All members would be most welcome to remain as members of ISS/SIC and work with a much larger global audience. We are hugely grateful to the founders of ASAP, and the principles for which it stood. These will continue within the ISS/SIC itself, and we welcome all those who supported the ASAP goals, to continue with their endeavours within the ISS/SIC body itself.

At the other end of the spectrum, a decision was taken at the General Assembly that we should welcome a society with whom we have had a long association, the International Association for Surgical Student Societies (IASSS), currently with some 10,000 members. The IASSS, in its eight years, has confirmed our view that the best place to recruit surgeons is when students start in medical school, introduce them to the stimulation and camaraderie of surgery, maintained throughout their training, and we will retain our association with them for the rest of their lives.

We will propose to the members of ISS, at our General Assembly in Mexico City, that International Association of Surgical Student Societies (IASSS) become a constitutionally fully integrated Society following the General Assembly in 2026. I would like to congratulate their President, SangEun Lee, Dr Sulé Burger, the IASSS Secretary-General, the Immediate Past-President Tatenda Mbanje and the entire team for their efforts. We look forward to a lifetime of surgery with you.

As you know, we have other categories of Participating Societies, such as Association for Women Surgeons (AWS), Burns (ISBI), Military (APIMSF), Global Initiative for Children's Surgery (GICS) and others. We have excellent relationships with other Colleges of Surgeons, and there is the American College of Surgeons (ACS) chapter and Japanese Surgical Chapter within the ISS/SIC. We work with Associated Societies, including College of Surgeon Academy of Medicine of Malaysia (CSAMM), College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka (CSSL), The Egyptian Society of Surgeons (ESS), Federación Latinoamericana de Cirugía (FELAC), College of Surgeons of East Central, and Southern Africa (COSECSA) all of whose members get a 50 % reduction on the ISS/SIC membership fee.

Non-surgical members

The general assembly endorsed the view of the council that your society needed to become more inclusive, particularly to recognize other members of health-care professions whose delivery of care is fully integrated into surgery. Foremost amongst these are our anaesthesiological and critical care colleagues. We also recognize that the lines between surgeons and other health care providers have become blurred, involving nurses, especially in Breast Care, Trauma and Critical Care, technicians (ISDS), and other advanced care disciplines such as Paramedics. We have therefore developed a new category of Associate Membership for these individuals with reduced rates, allowing our health care delivery to be much broader than before. This allows the building of surgical teams, not just surgeons.

The Constitutions of the ISS/SIC and these Integrated Societies have been changed to recognize the need for this and will be put to the General Assembly for final approval at the meeting in Mexico City.

As I write this, news is coming in of yet another massacre and atrocity, based on antisemitism. This time in Australia. Our deepest sympathy to all our Australian Colleagues, the victims and their families, and their communities. As providers all aspects of care for the surgical patient, we have to treat those who suffer, support the victims without fear or favour,

and use our talents, skills, and voices against those using violence to further their views. As the World's oldest Global Surgical Society, we have an obligation not only to practice the art and science of Surgery, but to take the lead in a tolerance and respect for all religions, which is desperately needed globally, especially now and in the current environment.

Nelson Mandela's favourite poem was Invictus, by William Ernest Henley:

*"Out of the night that covers me,
Black as the pit from pole to pole,
I thank whatever Gods may be,
For my unconquerable sole.*

*In the fell clutch of circumstances,
I have not winced nor cried aloud
Under the bludgeonings of chance,
My head is bloody but unbowed.*

*Beyond this place of wrath and tears,
Looms but the horror of the shade,
And yet the menace of the years,
Finds and shall find me unafraid.*

*It matters not how strait the gate,
How charged with punishments the scroll,
I am the master of my fate,
I am the captain of my soul."*

We owe it to all, to take the lead in condemning violence in this uncertain world, acting on behalf of our patients, our colleagues, and our profession. This has never been more important, and every one of us needs to take personal "Captaincy" at this time to assist wherever you may be.

I wish all our members and their families a happy holiday season, and a wonderful year to come.

COUNCILLORS-AT-LARGE:

The International Society of Surgery (ISS/SIC) is one of the most distinguished and prestigious surgical societies in the world. The first international surgical meeting of the Society was held in Brussels in 1905, chaired by the legendary Theodor Kocher. The mission of the ISS/SIC and its Integrated Societies is to support all aspects of care for the surgical patient, and to:

- Enhance surgical education, training, practice, and research around the world with an emphasis on less developed and resource-challenged countries.
- Organize the biennial **"International Surgical Week – The World's Congress of Surgery"**
- Publish the World Journal of Surgery

The ISS/SIC calls for the following nominations as members of the ISS/SIC Council for the period 2026 – 2028:

MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE ISS/SIC: COUNCILLORS-AT-LARGE

There will be FIVE (5) Councillors-at-Large

- Each will serve a term of two (2) years, renewable for a further two (2) years.
- Two (2) Councillors only will be newly elected at the General Assembly, serving a maximum term of four (4) years, and will serve from the end of International Surgical Week.
- One Councillor (Education) will serve a single term of two (2) years but may be

renewed for a further term of two (2) years, subject to the age restrictions on this appointment.

- The appointments will be in an Honorary capacity.

COUNCILLORS FOR APPOINTMENT w.e.f. ISW 2026

• Councillor-at-Large: Chair: Membership SubCommittee

- The Membership SubCommittee is chaired by a Councillor-at-Large of the ISS/SIC,
- The Membership SubCommittee is the main point of contact with Integrated Society Membership representatives and National Delegates of each Country
- The Chair maintains knowledge of the organization and demonstrates a personal commitment to its goals and objectives.
- The Chair is the main contact of the ISS/SIC for questions in regard to membership strategy.
- The Membership SubCommittee, in association with the Integrated Societies, and National Delegates, develops strategies to increase, retain and diversify membership of the International Society of Surgery.
- The Membership SubCommittee advises the Council itself on matters pertaining to membership of ISS.

• Councillor-at-Large: Chair: Surgical Education and Training

- The Surgical Training SubCommittee is chaired by a Councillor-at-Large of the ISS/SIC and is made up of National Delegates or Regional representatives, Representatives from the Integrated Societies, and includes a representative from IASSS, who will serve as Vice-Chair of the SubCommittee.
- The Chair should be an individual between 35 and 50 years of age at the time of his or her appointment and should be registered as a Specialist in Surgery or one of the Surgical Care disciplines.
- The Chair will interact and collaborate with other organizations to develop and coordinate global post-graduate surgical education.
- The SubCommittee will be responsible for advising the Council on all aspects of Surgical Education (knowledge base) and Surgical Training (skills base).

REQUIREMENTS FOR CHAIRS OF SUBCOMMITTEES

- Written application from the potential Candidate.
- Active membership of the ISS/SIC for a minimum of 5 years.

The following must be submitted:

- Curriculum vitae.
- A short motivation for the position.
- The applicant's vision for the ISS/SIC (maximum one A4 page).
- Name and contact details of three (3) referees.

The ISS/SIC commitment to Global Surgery, and specifically to representing Low- and Middle-Income Countries (LMICs) within the ISS/SIC ethos and ISW agenda has been amplified during the past 2 years. The commitment to LMIC representation within the society and as a focus of the International Surgical Week meeting has been strengthened, and the collaboration between the Global Health Affairs Chair and Committee and the Integrated Societies has been formalized and is growing. Importantly, the integration of the International Association of Student

Surgical Societies (IASSS) has offered a new opportunity for collaboration within the ISS Global Surgery commitment. I am grateful to the ISS/SIC Leadership for generously supporting LMIC speakers for ISW 2026. The financial commitment of the ISS/SIC has enhanced the dialogue with our LMIC colleagues and ensured the representation of low-resource challenges within the Global Surgery Program.

In Mexico City, during ISW 2026, the Global Surgery Agenda will be prominently represented, and 12 speakers and moderators from LMICs will be highlighted. With voices from Colombia, Ecuador, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Kenya, Malaysia, Rwanda, Nigeria, Philippines, South Africa, and Zambia we anticipate a globally relevant program and a robust discussion. Additionally, speakers from the WHO and the G4 Alliance

are contributing to the program, and the **Surgical Education Learners Forum (SELF)**, an open-source, global effort to improve surgical training in low-resource settings, will be held to follow ISW2026 and will offer additional gravitas to the Global Surgery Program.

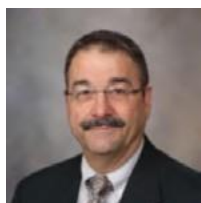

World Journal of Surgery WJS Report November 2025

2025 has been a whirlwind of a year. WJS has been actively pursuing affiliations with surgical groups to continue attracting and growing the journal's excellent content

and new readers. I am excited to report that in addition to the integrated ISS/SIC societies:

Breast Surgery International BSI, International Association for Trauma Surgery



IATSIC and Intensive Care, International Association for Surgical Metabolism and Nutrition IASMEN, and International Society for Digestive Surgery ISDS WJS now has six affiliations: These include International Association of Endocrine Surgeons (IAES), UN Global Surgery Learning Hub (SURGhub), Global Initiative for Children's Surgery (GICS), Explosive Weapons Trauma Care Collective (EXTRACCT), Clinical Robotics Surgery Association (CRSA), and Japan Association of Endocrine Surgeons (JAES). Each society has provided 2 global experts to join our growing editorial board. The impact of their contributions has already been seen. An example of this impact is the engagement with the material. A recent article published on June 28th has been downloaded 3100 times in 4 months, clearly a win in bringing readers to our journal and articles. We continue to grow WJS as a destination for great research.

Our editorial office and board have been bustling. Submissions have increased by 26% and published articles by 18% over 2024, with 175 new submissions each month, up from 141 last year. Most importantly, articles are being read with >50K full-text views per month, which is 10,000-15,000 higher than in 2024. We have an incredible 496,683 full-text article views in just the first 10 months, compared to

460,992 in 2024. In January WJS will no longer print issues. Less than ten people were still getting print issues, so we are happy to make this an environmentally positive move and give researchers what they are most interested in – namely, time to publication and their citation dates.

Wiley, our publisher, developed Research Exchange (ReX), a novel platform for manuscript submission, screening, and review. WJS went live on the platform in mid-June, and it has been a rocky start, as would be expected for any newly developed information system. Laura Shearer and I have spent a significant amount of time working through challenges and bugs – it is fortunately getting better every day. The site has added functionalities such as screening for prior submissions of the article, screening for AI-written material, and text suspicious for Papermill activity. I am interested in any feedback from ISS members on their experience with ReX. Wiley is modifying it based on user feedback, and it would be good to make it a website that works for us.

IATSIIC has been quite active this year. IATSIIC continues to collaborate with the World Health Organization in the development of a novel low-resource setting Trauma Operative Course. As a follow-on to the meeting held in Kuala Lumpur (ISW 2024), content is being finalized with a plan for a pilot course in Mexico City just prior to the April 2026 ISW meeting.

IATSIIC continues to be a strong member of the WHO Acute Care Action Network, a global alliance of key stakeholders committed to saving lives by advancing acute care through collaboration. IATSIIC is now a member of this network of more than 70 organizations promoting empowerment of communities as users and providers of acute care.

IATSIIC continues to support an online seminar series, partnering globally with various trauma societies to bring current topics and discussions to the global surgical community. We plan to continue partnering with multiple surgical and an-

esthesia societies to produce interesting content for our members.

In addition to the aforementioned WHO collaborative, IATSIIC remains the home of global trauma surgical training. We continue to offer the DSTC/DSATC course suite. The 6th edition of the manual has received great praise by current users, and we are already looking toward planning for a 7th edition of the manual. We anticipate more than 50 DSTC/DATC courses this year.

This fall, the second edition of the *National Trauma Management Course (NTMC)* was released. The global launch of this important program



occurred in September in Sri Lanka. A special thanks to Dr. Prof Ranjith Ellawalla for leading this monumental effort. The NTMC program remains a very popular course with long wait lists of participants. We are quite proud to have released a series of ERAS articles, a first in trauma care. Published in the *World Journal of Surgery* (August 2025), this was a collab-

orative between ERAS and IATSIIC. The ERATIC project (Enhanced Recovery After Trauma & Intensive care) will help to deliver best practice standards with best available evidence answering questions that we all face when managing injured patients. These standards should be able to be utilised regardless of the resources available. I encourage you to look at this series of three articles, which have been made available as open access.

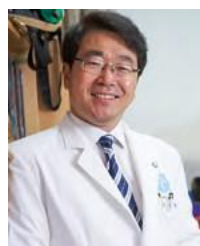

BSI has continued to grow from strength to strength over the past 15 months. The BSI Council has held four virtual meetings to discuss BSI activities and its mission. These have placed the society on a steady trajectory of growth and prominence.

Equally gratifying is that BSI's profile has been elevated through requests to collaborate with various eminent societies. This has expanded our global footprint.

BSI 2026 - Mexico City

Through the diligence of the Program Committee, ably assisted by the BSI Scientific Committee, and the collaboration of Dr. Enrique Bargallo, a local breast surgeon in Mexico City, the scientific program has been finalized. The program, which runs from the 20th of April 2026 to the 23rd April 2026, features 14 main sessions, including two prize sessions, two collaborative sessions with AWS, a free paper session, and the highly anticipated Umberto Veronesi Lecture.

In addition to these sessions, and in collaboration with the Mexican Oncology Society (SMEO), we are planning two sponsored breakfast sessions. The speakers and topics of these sessions will be the sponsors' preserve.

As in past years, we have planned two pre-congress workshops at the congress venue i.e Camino Real Hotel. The program has been finalized, and the Fac-

ulty for each has been confirmed. These workshops have been very popular and well-attended in the past.

- **Ultrasound Workshop:** Saturday, 18th April 2026, 08:00 to 17:00 – Limited to 70 delegates on a first-come, first-served basis.
- **Oncoplastic Surgery Workshop:** Sunday, 19th April 2026, 08:00 to 17:30 – Limited to 70 participants, also on a first-come, first-served basis. There is an option to increase the number if there is unprecedented interest in this workshop.

We are particularly pleased with the number of abstracts received. In total, 75 abstracts were reviewed by the BSI Scientific Committee. Of these, 30 will be presented as oral or visual abstract presentations, and the remainder will be exhibited as posters.

BSI Educational activities

The ethos of the BSI Council is that knowledge and education should not be the preserve of a privileged few. This should be available to all who manage patients with breast pathology. To this end, our online educational activities are free.

Journal Club

To date, we have presented two virtual journal clubs. In December 2024, we discussed the paper, "Universal Genetic Testing for Newly Diagnosed Invasive Breast Cancer", published in *JAMA*, and presented by one of the co-authors, Professor Stephanie Wong



from McGill University in Canada. The second manuscript, "Active Monitoring With or Without Endocrine Therapy for Low-Risk Ductal Carcinoma In Situ: The COMET Randomized Clinical Trial" also published in *JAMA*, was presented by a co-author of the study, Professor Alastair Thompson, in June 2025. Both events were admirably organized by Susanna Kauhanen, the chairperson of the BSI Scientific Committee, and facilitated by the efficient Ms. Denise Egger of the ISS office. We are planning a third virtual Journal Club in February 2026.

BSI webinar

A webinar on the role of breast-conserving surgery in T4b lesions is scheduled for 10th January 2026. This virtual multidisciplinary discussion will address a topic of relevance to low-resourced environments where advanced breast cancer is a significant problem.

BSI Collaborations

Research

BSI was part of an international collaborative consensus study with the Edinburgh Breast Unit on axillary management in node-positive breast can-



cer patients undergoing neoadjuvant chemotherapy. This study has resulted in a publication ***Axillary management in node-positive breast cancer in patients undergoing neoadjuvant chemotherapy: NAC-AX Delphi consensus study***, which is currently under review.

• Courses

BSI endorsed the very relevant and important **BRIDGE course** in September 2025. The BRIDGE Course is a global online program bringing together leading breast cancer surgeons from across the world to share evidence-based, resource-adapted surgical techniques for low- and middle-income countries and is the first of its kind.

• Taskforce

BSI was invited to collaborate on the **Breast Cancer Surgeon Taskforce (BEST)**. This collaboration with the Chinese College of Surgeons on Breast Cancer, the ASBrS and the ESSO is aimed at academic exchange via joint conferences, virtual meetings, and hospital visits.

• Outreach

BSI signed a 4-year Memorandum of Understanding with the College of Surgeons, Academy of Medicine of Malaysia to offer a Breast and Endocrine Surgery Training Course in Malaysia. This collaboration aims to enhance the skills and knowledge of healthcare professionals in the region, fostering better practices in breast and endocrine surgery. The course was held from the 6th – 7th November 2025 and BSI was represented by Professors Ipshita Prakash, Pooja Ramakant and Sandra Krishnan. By all accounts, the course was highly successful.

WJS matters

The WJS celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2026. BSI has been tasked with contributing to this anniversary issue. The entire BSI Council is involved with preparing a 3,000-word document on the top five innovations in breast cancer management over the past 50 years (1976 – 2026).

In closing, BSI is a vibrant, dynamic society, ascending in prominence in the global breast community. Join us in April 2026 in Mexico City to share your experience, net-

work with like-minded colleagues and join forces in the global battle against breast cancer.

The ISDS Education Committee, chaired by my Matthew Walsh from Cleveland Clinic

USA, with a mandate to expand the society's educational outreach to current and future members, held the first of many webinars on digestive surgery in September. The webinar titled "Gastrointestinal Anastomotic Leaks: Prevention and Management" was chaired by Chetan Bhan from Cleveland Clinic London with Discussants Michele Ammendola from Italy and Alice Murray from London. 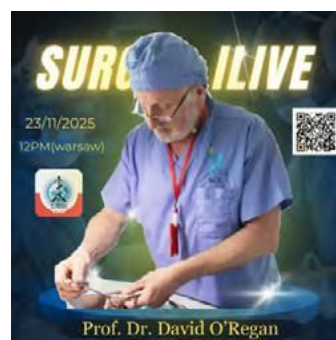
**12 November 2025:
